


Under D.C. Superior Court Criminal Rule 11(c)(1)(C), the parties "agree that a specific sentence or sentencing range is the appropriate disposition the (such recommendation or request binds the court once the court accepts the plea agreement)."




#### **Overall Trends**

- Between October 1, 2021 and September 30, 2022, there were a total of **1,430** felony counts sentenced in D.C. Superior Court
  - ≥ 266 of these felony counts (19%) were sentenced pursuant to a Rule 11(c)(1)(C) plea



## **Offense and Sentencing Trends**

- While Violent offenses represented 28% of all counts sentenced in FY22, they accounted for over 40% of all 11(c)(1)(C)pleas imposed in the same timeframe
- **60%** of all Murder sentences were imposed under Rule 11(c)(1)(C)comparatively, only 3% of all Drug sentences were imposed under a Rule 11(c)(1)(C) plea
- 73% of the sentences following a Rule 11(c)(1)(C) plea were prison sentences



### **Offender Characteristics**

- 97% of the defendants were Male
- 96% of the defendants were Black
- The average age at offense was 30 years old; the median age at offense was 27 years old
- 74% of the defendants had been convicted of a prior offense
