Common Aggravating Departure Factors:

- (A1) Deliberate cruelty to a victim or gratuitous violence inflicted upon a victim in a manner substantially beyond that normally associated with this offense.
- (A3) Victim sustained a "devastating injury."
- (A11) Substantial and compelling basis comparable in gravity to those listed which aggravates substantially the seriousness of the offense or the def.'s culpability.

Common Mitigating Departure Factors:

- (M2) Before detection in a crime other than a Crime of Violence (COV), the def. compensated or made a good faith effort to compensate.
- (M5) The def., with no apparent predisposition to do so, was induced by others to participate in the crime.
- (M6) The def.'s capacity to appreciate the wrongfulness of conduct or to conform their conduct to the requirements of law was impaired significantly, though not sufficiently to constitute a complete defense.
- (M7) Def. provided substantial assistance to police.
- (M9) Consecutive/concurrent sentencing policy results in a Guidelines sentence so excessive in relation to the seriousness of the offense and history of the def. that imposition would result in manifest injustice.
- (M11) Substantial and compelling basis comparable in gravity to those listed which substantially mitigates the seriousness of the offense or the def.'s culpability.

Supervised Release:

Under D.C. Code § 24-403.01(b), the following terms of supervised release must be given. (Note, however, that supervised release should be suspended if any portion of the sentence is suspended).

Note: If the defendant is sentenced for an offense for which sex registration is required, the court may impose a longer term of supervised release of not more than ten years unless the defendant is required to register for life, in which case the supervised release may not exceed a life term.

Note: Supervised release does not apply to misdemeanors.

Backup Time:

"Backup time" is the maximum additional penalty that may be applied following revocation of a defendant's supervised release. Pursuant to D.C. Code §§ 24-403.01(b)(7) and (b-1) the following periods of "back up time" apply if a defendant's Supervised Release is revoked.

<u>Note:</u> Except for Class A and life term felonies, the "backup time" must be subtracted from the statutory maximum sentence that can be imposed.

Probation:

A term of probation under D.C. Code § 16-710, along with any extension thereof, may not exceed five years. The Guidelines apply to a sentence following revocation of probation, however, the term of probation imposed is not covered by the Guidelines.

Important Sentencing Guidelines Notes

- The court shall use the Guidelines Manual in effect on the date of plea or verdict.
- The Guidelines are voluntary. However, judges must give a legal sentence. A judge may always elect not to follow the Guidelines. If you elect not to follow the Guidelines, please state your reasons on the record and note them on the sentencing screen so that the information can be maintained by the Commission.
- The offense of conviction, not the alleged offense conduct, controls the Offense Severity Group (OSG).
- Offenses are part of a single event if they were committed at the same time and place or have the same nucleus of facts. See §§ 1.3.7 and 10.15. This is a factual determination initially made by CSOSA and ultimately determined by the court. Only the most severe conviction arising out of a single event is scored for prior convictions. § 3.1.
- For initial scoring purposes, CSOSA compares the name and statutory elements of a prior out-of-District (OOD) offense, not the underlying conduct, with the current D.C. offense that most closely matches the OOD offense. See § 5.6(a).
- While an offense may not be counted or scored for Criminal History Score (CHS) purposes, the court may still consider it when determining where a defendant should be sentenced within the applicable box.
- The party challenging the initial scoring bears the burden. See §§ 3.9 and 5.5 for more information on challenging the CHS.
- Please record departures from the Guidelines, changes to a defendant's CHS, or any other relevant information on the sentencing screen and/or in a docket entry.
